> Our topics so far have been 'All about me', 'Space, light and dark' and then ending the term with 'Christmas'. In these topics we have explored family trees, who lives in our house, and our likes and dislikes.

We discovered how to make a rocket, learnt about different stars, and investigate the Christmas story and how it all came around.

This leans us in to the brilliant Christmas play 'The Shining Signing Star' that we have been practicing. Thank you in advance for all of the incredible costumes you have all bought or created, they made our performance so much brighter.


have much better screens. In RE we have
