What a fantastic term we have had!

Literacy: Under The Sea

We have enjoyed the topic under the sea. The children learnt facts about sea creatures and discovering what happens at the seaside. We read non-fiction books and shared what we learnt. We enjoyed reading *Sharing a Shell*, this enabled us to talk about our feelings in PSED and work together to share in the learning areas too. The children explored lots of texts including *The Singing Mermaid*, *The Lighthouse Keepers Lunch* and *Billy's Bucket*.

We welcomed a visitor, the poet Matt Goodfellow and we joined in with his rhyming stories and made up our own riddles and rhymes. We also enjoyed visiting the library and had a Book-nic party. We reviewed the books we read as we ate snacks and drank juice.



Maths

We have ordered numbers and used addition to add and subtract. We problem solved to share our pirate treasure. We designed our own patterned fish and talked about how we worked out our answers. We learnt about capacity and measured to see which jug held the most pirate punch.

Science

We explored magnets and looked for magnetic and non-magnetic treasure. We learnt about sinking and floating and selected different materials to make our own boats. We predicted and tested to see if our boats sank or floated.



Drama

The children have become more confident to talk and act out familiar stories in our drama lessons. It has been lovely to see the children express themselves and really get into character with an audience watching.



Achieving

We have had a great year and have learnt so much. I couldn't be any prouder of the individual achievements each child has made. The children have learnt to share, care and respect each other. The children have formed great friendships that I know they will carry on into their next class. They have learnt through play and been a true pleasure to teach. They are now ready to show their next teachers how truly amazing they are!

Reception **What a year we have had in Reception!**



As we reflect on this year, although it has not been as we expected, we have not let it stop us from having fun, learning lots of new things, having some great adventures and making new friends.

We have been very busy! We have been marvellous mathematicians working on numbers to 20 and beyond, using our problem solving and investigating skills discovering shapes, patterns, weighing, measuring and capacity.



We have been actors on the stage and in the role play are and even been authors and wrote our own books about an animal that came to tea.



We have been scientists and done lots of investigations, We discovered which materials are water proof and not water proof, transparent and opaque, used our senses to describe changes in the seasons and learnt about what plants need to grow.

As well as this, we have used our geography skills when looking at our world, recorded local area maps,

talked about features of our local area and then used other natural and man-made features when we created our own pirate maps.



We have also been construction workers, gardeners, athletes, dancers, artists, cooks, singers, musicians and story tellers all this whilst looking after ourselves through a global pandemic!



Home learning has also been part of this year's journey. We have enjoyed story time sessions, completed on line learning challenges but our favourite activity was our bingo games. We have shown resilience, perseverance and can-do attitudes. The focus was on understanding why animals have their colours and markings. It's not all been parties and dancing though as the children have worked hard on developing the skills that they will use throughout school. Central to this has been the fantastic work Mrs Parkinson has been doing during Wellbeing Wednesdays. The children have been building confidence by acting out stories and putting on small group plays that have brought out some



amazing acting skills. The children have also learnt about trust, friendship and good communication during these sessions as well and we have been impressed in how much better they speak to one another because of this.

It's been a challenging but rewarding year for us all and we should all be very proud of what has been achieved, especially with what we've had to stand in our way. Well done Year 1, fantastic by name, fantastic by nature.

Year 2 What a wonderful year in Year 2!

Wow! What an amazing second half of the year we have had! All the children persevered through the lockdown and came back fighting, determined not to be defeated by the challenges they faced. Their effort, enthusiasm and commitment this year has been commendable and I am proud of every single one of them!

They have enjoyed discovering and learning so many new things from superlative adjectives in Phonics to who George Washington-Carver and Jane Goodall are in Science to the history and geography of Hattersley and how multiplication, division, fractions and time are all linked. They have become amazing pattern detectives!

We've made our own dragon machines, reenacted the life of a pirate, had a campfire, a visit from the Wise Owl Birds of Prey Sanctuary and the poet Matt Goodfellow, a letter from 'Plop' but most importantly we learnt the importance of communication in teamwork when we had to rescue Leaf (the polar bear) to take him home. From these inspiring experiences the children have written their own stories, diary entries, their own chapter story, a non-chronological report on Discovery Academy, a set of directions and wrote their own free-verse poem. They have embraced using plot points and grammar terminology well and taken it all in their stride, working well together to edit their work or deepen the moment.

They have enjoyed using practical apparatus in Maths and moving towards recording their working out using pictorial representations like bar modelling to find fractions of amounts. They even challenged themselves to find the times table link and how they can use their times tables to solve fractions and tell the time! They are all Maths Wizards and Writing Heroes!

It has been a pleasure teaching Year 2 this year and I can't wait to hear about their achievements in Year 3 next year!



Year 3 A great start to KS2!

We have had a fantastic term in Year 3. In English, we have really focused on delivering each topic in The Write stuff style which has really impacted on the children's writing. We have had several fantastic experience days including a visit from The Wise Owl Rescue, a campfire with s'mores and hot chocolate and a pirate obstacle course. The writing content and stamina of the children



has really improved and they have made great vocabulary choices. I think the texts that are my personal favourites would be LEAF and The Owl Who is Afraid of the Dark as the stories the children invented afterwards really blew us away!



Maths has been focused on multiplication and division for the first part of the summer term and then fractions for the second part. The children have really impressed us with how hard they have been working on their times table knowledge. They have even challenged the adults on TTRockstars. Although closely contested, Miss Owen is the reigning class champion. Who will be the one to change that?

We really enjoyed learning about Ancient Egypt and Howard Carter, the archaeologist who discovered the tomb of Tutankhamun. The children completed some fantastic diary entries as Howard Carter on the day he made this monumental discovery.



We have also learnt all about forces and magnets, carrying out lots of different investigations. The children really enjoyed watching what happens to iron filings when a magnet is placed near them. In Summer 2, we focused on rocks and fossils as our topic in Science and I think it may possibly have been one of the children's favourites of the year! All of the children were really engaged with this topic and keen to hunt for and find fossils and rocks of their own. So much so Mrs Oldham had to ask them to stop digging next to the MUGA post as they were discovering lots of rocks there (cement holding the post in)!!

Geography this term has been all around natural disasters and the children have really taken on board the devastating effects that can happen as a result of the disaster. Their caring, kind natures were really highlighted in a lesson where they thought about ways in which we could offer help.

This was also evident when we learnt the song Stand By Me both singing and in Sign Language. The children were amazing just as they have been throughout this trying and difficult year.



Thank you Year 3 for a wonderful year of fun, laughter and smiles you really are all SUPERSTARS and we are all very, very proud of you.

Year 4 A summer of excitement in Year 4!

We have had a fabulous term in Year 4 and as always, had lots of fun! One of the highlights of this term was our Mars Day. Not only did we get to see how robots on the red planet work, but we also had the opportunity to have an interview with British astronaut Tim Peake, who spoke to us about everything it takes to prepare for a trip to space. After this, we created our own designs for rockets and robot that could explore Mars. It got us very excited about the topic and inspired some of the children so much that they are now determined to be work in aerospace.



This term, we have been doing lots of work on maps. We have been comparing the cities of Manchester and Chester and looking at the similarities and differences between them. The children have really impressed us in the way that they can now use grid references to find something on a map as well as know what the symbols mean on an Ordnance Survey map. Finally, we put our skills to use as the children read their maps in a hunt around Hattersley.



We have had a very active term and taken part in lots of sporting events. We took part in the Tameside SSP daily challenges for a month and each day pushed ourselves to post our best scores. As well as this, we also had our Sports Day, where the children competed in both teams and as individuals. It was so impressive to see the way that the children motivated one another to do their best. In Year 4, we also celebrated Euro 2020. We began the tournament by having a reading from children's author Tom Palmer. In addition to this, we followed the

tournament each day by filling in a wallchart and taking part in a class sweepstake.

We have been very creative this term in many different ways. In Design Technology, we made cam toys. The children spent a long time researching different designs and deciding which features they liked. They were then given a brief, which they had to meet before creating their designs. Finally, the children were given all the resources they needed and used their plans to create their toys. We were very pleased with the outcome and it was great to see how proud the children were of what they had created. Another time where the children had to use their creative side, was on Poetry Day. We were fortunate enough to have the poet Matt Goodfellow attend the school and show us how he creates his ideas and writes his poems. The children then did a workshop with him and created their own poems all about things that are important to them.



Overall, it has been an brilliant yet obviously unusual year. We have had a blast in Year 4 and are so proud of the children for all the effort they have put in and resilience they have shown throughout.

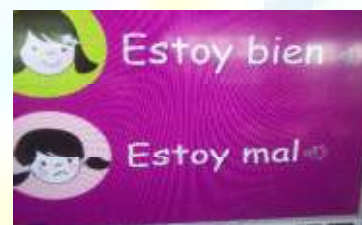

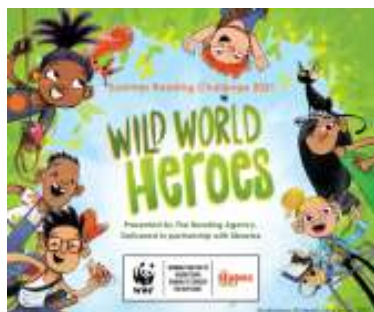

PREGNANT OR HAVE CHILDREN UNDER FOUR? **NHS**

Don't miss out on **HEALTHY START** vouchers: worth up to £8.50 a week per child

The vouchers can be spent on:

- fresh fruit or veg (including veg chopping, packaged or loose)
- milk and cereal (except rice)
- you can also spend on fish or chicken

Do I qualify for Healthy Start?

You qualify for Healthy Start if you're at least 19 weeks pregnant or have a child under four years old and you or your partner get either:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Child Tax Credit (with a family income of £10,160 or less per year)
- Universal Credit (with a family income of less than £10K or less than £100K)

Can't find out? The Department of Health and Social Care agreed to temporarily extend the Healthy Start scheme to help all eligible pregnant women and get included those missing private health as a consequence of their registration status.

At least half of eligible families in Tameside are missing out on their food vouchers
