<u>Discovery Academy Welcomes Mr. Doolan</u>

Mr. Doolan was officially sworn in as Discovery Academies Sports and Wellbeing coach in September and we are very excited with what we have seen so far. We have already stepped up our After School Club offering as well as the sporting competitions that we are able to attend we are looking forward to more of the same in 2022.

In P.E this term, each class has worked to a high standard and have shown improvement and development in a wider range of skills.

KS1 have been working on ball skills this term with the use of their hands, which has led them to learn more about activities, which require those skills such as Netball and Basketball, and why those skills taught can be implemented when playing a variety of games. The children have shown the ability to dribble with control into open spaces, passing accurately with a chest or bounce pass and have also been looking at improving their sending and receiving skills, improving their catching, meaning they are now able to track balls and react quicker which has allowed them to do more games which require them to work as a team.



Years 3 & 4 have been introduced to Tennis this term and have made excellent progress. From learning about holding the racquet correctly, to improving their fundamental skills such as close control, to learning about the technical aspects of the game and when is best to use a specific shot and even how to win a point. The forehand and backhand shots have been two important elements of the game which the children have all shown improvements on and have been challenged with the introduction of the net, which has allowed them to improve on the technique enabling them to become more accurate and giving them the ability to score points.

This term year 5 have put the skills taught in play leaders into practice, exceeding all expectations. They are becoming more adaptable with the games they have learned and becoming more



independent, finding new ways to make it more enjoyable for all participants. This also led to building stronger relationships with the KS1 & KS2 children involved in their games as well as with their partner. Since September year 5 have also been lucky enough to go to Hyde leisure pool, improving on a wide range of important skills. The improvement has been clear to see this term, each child has shown more confidence in their surroundings, as well as being asked to complete 25 meters unaided in the pool.

Afterschool sports clubs this term have been Hockey. KS1 have been introduced to the fundamental skills, and have all succeeded in being able to hold with the correct grip, allowing them to dribble and pass with more control, this gradually led to the introduction of small sided games. KS2 have been challenged by only being allowed to use the single side of the stick, which allows controlled dribbling. They have also learnt, about passing more accurately and the different ways to receive a pass. This led to the children to be a lot more confident in their ability and some were lucky enough to represent the school in a quick stix Hockey festival earlier this term, where they excelled and were a great representation for the school.

<u> Curriculum update - English</u>

<u>Junior Librarians</u>

This Autumn term we re-introduced our Reading Librarians. Since then, they have been working with Miss Brown on promoting a love of reading in our school. They have been working super hard learning how to use Library Cloud so they can add new reading books and check them in and out as well



as creating book areas within the library. They have also joined Tameside Library's reading champions programme, meeting other librarians from other Tameside schools over Zoom. From this they have been researching new books to add to our library and discussing how to promote reading for pleasure throughout our school.

<u>Reading Advent</u>



This term our librarians came up with a fantastic idea of a Reading Advent Calendar. They found lots of Christmas/Winter stories and poems and organised them to suit the year group. On the 1st December they came around and delivered each class their box of books and even read Nursery

their first story. The children in EYFS and KS1 have absolutely loved unwrapping a book every day and listening to all the wonderful stories! All the children in KS2 have thoroughly enjoyed unwrapping a poem a day to read and have chosen a Christmas based novel to share.

New books, New Year

Every class has been able to take home a book from the library every week. This gives every child an opportunity to choose a book that suits their interests and promotes reading for pleasure. All the children have settled in well, and have made a fantastic start to the term. The children have made new friends and have had a fun and exciting term.

The children have been working on relationships, playing together in groups, initiating conversation and building on roleplay. We have talked about being kind and how we can show this to each other. We have worked on managing our own hygiene and personal needs. We have been working hard to embed our school values Discovering, Inspiring, Caring, Improving and Achieving, and have always tried our best.

In September we began our topic 'All about me'. We explored ourselves and the world we live in through the book 'Here we are' by Oliver Jeffers. We discovered more about our Planet Earth and where we live. We talked about our families and how we are all different and important. We used our senses to investigate our likes and dislikes, listened to environmental sounds and learnt about our body parts through the song 'Head Shoulders Knees and Toes'.



The children enjoyed our nursery Rhyme topic and re-told a variety of traditional nursery rhymes. During Literacy we created Get Well Cards for Humpty Dumpty and investigate who pushed him off the wall! We have been reciting numbers 1-10 and used practical apparatus to count and compare size and shapes. During Science we re-used and selected different materials to build our own 'Dingle Dangle Scarecrow'

This term we have been very excited to explore the topic 'Colour' and how colour is used in many different celebrations. We used our 'Potion Lab' to create colourful Fireworks for Bonfire night and used alliteration in literacy to create their sounds. We enjoyed learning about Diwali, and made Diva lamps to celebrate the festival of light. We made red poppies for Remembrance Day and designed colourful pictures to raise awareness for Children in Need. The children especially enjoyed learning about Christmas and learnt to sing Twinkle Twinkle Little star in Spanish for our EYFS Nativity.





We read the text 'Colour monster' and talked about the different emotions we feel. We have enjoyed exploring colour mixing to make new colours. We have been on wellie walks and looked at the different signs of Autumn. We collected lots of natural resources and made observations during science and counted, weighed compared and sorted in Maths. The children have enjoyed exploring the fun of snow and the changes in season. It has been

a very busy first term! The children have worked so hard and we are so proud of them.


Our knowledge of Autumn has grown as we did our wellie walks and looked at the changes. We were able to share the

Year of the Dynamos!

We welcomed the children back with optimism in September as the country began to open its doors once more. We started the Year looking at a fantastic story by one of our school authors Nadia Shireen. The children loved how the Terrible beast was tricked by Billy and how in the end it was the beast who was never seen again, The End!

In our English, the first term has been focused around the rules for a great sentence. We looked at what a good sentence needed and then learnt how to make it even better by using new and fancy words such as adjectives and even adverbs. The children have been working on putting capital letters in the right place, using finger spaces and adding full stops, question marks or exclamation marks to the end of their sentences. We have also been working hard on how we present our work, the letter formation and size of our letters is just as important as what we have written.

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In Maths, we have been diving deep into the world of numbers and place value this term. We started by looking at a group of objects and what it represented, added numbers then we and had the children match the number to the group. This led on to looking at different ways of representing each number, we introduced a part whole model, tens frame and mathematical symbols. The children were able to use these tools to complete lots of different activities that teach fluency, reasoning and problem solving; three important elements need to fully understand maths.



During our Science we looked at Sir Isaac Newton up until half term, we learned about his life and what he was famous for. When also looked at the different scientific methods he used to conduct his ground-breaking experiments. We ended by looking at his most famous theory and had great fun making machines that combated the effects that gravity had on an egg. We also was encourage the learning at home but in this case; maybe we send home a warning! © Up until Christmas we have been looking at Animals, we started by classifying animals in to

groups and by what they chose to eat. We then looked closely at us as animals, we learnt about different body parts and how we use them before looking at our senses.

Our History topic was all about Rosa Parks, an inspirational figure in the equal rights movement in the 60s. The children loved learning about her life and the bravery she showed in standing up for her rights and the rights of millions of people. We did some work around what makes us brave and how we should act if we saw something we knew was not right and the children were brilliant in their responses and actions

Year 2 What a wonderful start to Year 2!

All the children have settled really well into Year 2 this term and their effort and commitment to their work has been commendable.

They have enjoyed discovering and learning so many new things from how to spell some of the Year 2 Common Exception Words to Walter Tull and Albert Einstein to what it is to be a hero and understanding the value and addition and subtraction of numbers up to 100.





We've had a visit from a witch who took over our library, had breaking news from a rescue mission of poor Miss Goodson, re-enacted football matches from the past, completed the mystery book activity, journeyed over the ocean to Grandad's island,

completed science investigations, had a virtual visit from an illustrator and visited

Stockport Plaza for the Christmas Pantomime.

From these inspiring experiences the children have written newspaper articles, character descriptions, stories, setting descriptions and diary entries and

have started to improve their written work independently by developing their editing skills.

They have enjoyed using practical apparatus in Maths to explore new addition and subtraction concepts and have shown a deep understanding of these through their reasoning and problem solving.

Year 2 have worked super hard and I am proud of all they have achieved this term!

Year 3 A great start to KS2!

We have had a fantastic start to the school year in Year 3. In English, we have used The Write stuff to create several fantastic pieces of writing, including exciting stories based on The Incredible Book Eating Boy, and compelling speeches linked to our History learning about Martin Luther King and the Civil Rights Movement. Our class text in before half term was Foul Play, and the author, Tom Palmer, loved



reading about our learning on Twitter! We have had some fantastic experience days including a sneaky visit from The Book Eating Boy himself. The creativity and vocabulary of the children's writing has blown us away, and we can't wait to see what they write next!

Maths has been focused on place value for the first half of the autumn term, then in the second half of the term pupils used applied this knowledge to addition and subtraction. The children have really impressed us with their explanations of their working using tricky maths concepts. And they have loved challenging each other to see who can be reigning champion of our Times Tables Game!



In Science, we learned the skills we need in order to conduct fair and accurate investigations, then applied this knowledge to discovering all about light and how it travels. We loved testing different materials from around our classroom to see which make the best reflectors. And the children's knowledge of transparent, translucent and opaque materials came in very handy when designing a pair of curtains!

Our whole-school science day about pollution and climate change was a real highlight of our term. We found out lots of ways we can help our planet by reducing, reusing and recycling plastic – and we put this into practice by turning some old bottles heading for the bin into fantastic artworks!

In Geography this term we have been looking at the different countries and areas which make up the UK. The children found out lots of interesting things about our own local area,

and they were able to combine this learning with our DT lessons when we made butter and bread just like farmers in Hattersley would have done long ago!

We were inspired by our History learning about Martin Luther King Jr, the preacher and activist who campaigned for Civil Rights. The children



completed some wonderful non-chronological reports exploring the reasons MLK is seen as a hero by so many, and the lessons we can take from his story today.

In Art, we learned how to use simple but effective pencil shading techniques to create eyepopping illustrations. We had a blast when Caroline Coates came to visit the school and taught us how to make beautiful paper lanterns, decorated with our own artwork.

The children have been a pleasure to teach and their effort and resilience has absolutely shone. Thank you to Year 3 for an amazing term, you are all STARS and we can't wait for next year!!!

Year 4

A term of excitement in Year 4!

We have had a fabulous term in Year 4! The children have settled in so well and it has been a pleasure to see the kindess they show to one another. They really are a tightly knit unit.



We began the year with Enterprise Day. The children used their buisness skills to put a plan together for how to make the most profit out of a product that they would create. They decided on bookmarks and paperweight. They then sold these at the fair at the end of the day and (thanks to your generousity) made a good profit.

In the first half of the term, the children learnt all about the Aborignies. Miss Brown and I were so impressed with the questions the children had in order to gain an understanding of Aboriginal culture. As well as studying the history, we learnt the tales from folklore and learnt about famous people of Aboriginal decent, such as Cathy Freeman. In Art, the children produced superb pieces based on pointilism that were in the style of cave art from Australia.





We have looked a lot at the

environment this term and the children have really driven this as a focus. As well as looking at the what has taken place at COP26, we have focused on the difference that we can make as a school. The children attended a sustainable future workshop based on the 4 Rs: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle and Repair.

During Inter-faith Week, we looked a many different religions from around the religion. The children explored the similarites and differences between them as well as looking in more detail at the traditions and celebrations related to each one. The week finished with a workshop looking at different artifacts and books that allowed us to explore each religion further.





One thing that I noticed when I met the class was that many of the children have a real love of sport. They impress me and Mr Doolan every PE lesson. Many of the children in Year 4 represented the school football teams in their first ever games! We could not have been prouder of them. The children had excellent knowledge of their sporting idols.

Overall, it's been a superb term and we can't wait for a just as exciting one next term!

Year 5

Exploring new texts each week has allowed us to learn about a huge range different topics including Hanukkah, European landmarks, and even a Demon Headmaster (totally fictional, of course).

The children have **achieved** so much this term that it could not possibly be covered in a single page. Through our regular swimming lessons as part of our P.E curriculum, the children have been achieving at great lengths and have learn not only how to swim well, but safely too. These achievements extend to our House Captains, who have taken hold of their new responsibilities with both hands and rolled with them; the improvements the school is seeing across the board is amazing!

Lunchtime clubs Lego buddies

KS1 and 2 children have enjoyed attending our lunch time Lego buddies club with Mrs Kirkbride and Mrs Clare. We come together each week and enjoy working together in pairs or small teams to build different models.

The purpose is develop the children's listening skills, promote team



building and build confidence as well as respect for each other within the group. We have been amazed at some of the models the children have built, the children have used their imagination and enjoyed sharing their models with their peers.

The children have w<mark>orked on</mark> problem solving and have been able to develop social interaction skills as well as collaborate on a joint project. We have seen

a boost <mark>to their self-esteem and most</mark> importantly the children look forward to attending each week. The children have so much fun that they don't even realise that they are learning important skills!



Reading club

This term has seen the introduction of our reading club. Children have been coming to the library to enjoy the amazing books on offer.

We have been looking closely at The Enormous Turnip. The children have innovated the story and come up with some amazing ideas of their own. We have had 'The Amazing Giant Potato' and 'The Enormous Carrot' stories. The children have acted out their own version of the story and we have talked about the meaning of lots of words in the book whilst looking at how we could make the story better. We had lots of fun pretending to pull out an



enormous carrot and potato out of the ground.

We then looked at the story Rumpelstiltskin. We liked the idea of spinning straw into gold and thought about other things we could turn straw into......Chocolate was quite a popular idea!

At the end of each session, we take it in turns to read a book together. We are looking forward to enjoying more amazing stories next term.

Leadership Groups Focus Eco-Council

This year we have re-launched our Eco council and have added to our ranks. Our council

members have been challenged to complete three huge tasks this year and one task came along very quickly.

During the final week of the first half term, we came together as a school to take part in Science Day. This year our theme was Looking After Our Planet. Each class had a topic that centred on things we can do to make school, home and our environment better. The Eco council members were charged with presenting back some of the wonderful activities that were completed during the day in a celebration assembly that took place in the afternoon. The Eco council went above and beyond in their classes and some of the feedback that was presented was fantastic. A brilliant start to what we at Discovery hopes to be a successful young leadership group.



Now that is only the first of the challenges for the group. Challenge two is to engage with our wider community and raise awareness of the need to Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. So when we were approached by a local group to help with a greener Hattersley project the Eco council jumped at the opportunity. The project was to create an awareness board that will displayed at the community Doctors Surgery. The first task was to create a design and with the help of a local artist we came together and decided on an idea for our mural. Our task after Christmas will be to complete the painting of this on a huge board that will be displayed on the fencing at the doctors. We have also been invited to the unveiling of the boards and the children are very excited to be attending.



Our final challenge will be to create a community poster that we can circulate, asking for the support of the local people in our fight against climate change. To do this we are hoping to have a meeting with a climate change specialist who can help us focus on what people in Hattersley can do to help. Then we will design the poster and finally have it printed and hung up around the locality of the school.

Digital leaders

Each class in Years 1 to 5 have 2 Digital Leaders. These children have an interest in technology and their role involves supporting the class teacher with technology, promoting online safety and testing games and apps.

In our first meeting the children were excited to tell me all about our new Chrome Books. Each class had used these and all the children were positive about them. The challenge was remembering individual usernames and passwords to login to the Chrome books and after thinking about this, the group decided that if each child used the same number Chrome book each week, they would only need to remember their password.



Each of our meetings have an online safety section and in our first meeting we talked about personal information and the importance of keeping passwords safe. We also talked about what we would do if we were concerned that someone had access to our personal information.

We didn't have any games or apps to test in our first meeting, but the children had tried out various typing games and were able to share which games they liked best and why.

In or second meeting, it was great to hear that the Digital Leaders had been helping their classes with the Chrome books. They were confident talking about what they had been learning in their Computing lessons, which included making Christmas cards, researching about blogs and making videos.



In our online safety section, we talked about how much screen time we should be having and decided a little bit of time often was better than spending lots of time on devices, especially at home.

The Digital leaders are going to be testing two resources over the next few weeks; Spelling Frame and Maths frame. I look forward to hearing how they find these websites in our next meeting.

Next term, the Digital Leaders will also be helping to plan Safer Internet Day which is the 8th February.

Good night! Sleep well!

Did you sleep well last night? How do feel when you wake up in the morning?

Sleep is very important. It isn't just a time to rest; in fact your brain and your body are both very active when you sleep.

For children especially, sleep is a time when

- The body battles infections
- Memories are consolidated
- Growth hormones are released



Sleep is important for your mental and physical health and a poor night's sleep can lead to poor memory, irritability, low mood and impaired concentration.

How much sleep does a child need?



What is a sleep problem?

It is normal to wake a few times in the night, but this is a problem if you are unable to go back to sleep. Some sleep problems can be divided into categories

Insomnia – difficulty settling to sleep, waking early in the morning or during the night and not being able to return to sleep. It can also include sleeping enough, but still feeling tired.

Excessive daytime sleepiness – a lack of energy, feeling sleepy and even falling asleep during the day even though you feel like you have slept well the night before. This can cause younger children to be over-active or restless.

Parasomnias – unusual movements or behaviours while asleep e.g. sleep-walking, nightmares or sleep paralysis.

What is sleep hygiene?

Sleep hygiene is about the good behaviours which help an individual to get regular, good quality sleep. It includes

- Routine a bedtime routine should last between 30-60 minutes and be soothing or calming for the child to show the day is ending. This could include a bath, changing into pyjamas, brushing teeth and a bedtime story. The bedtime routine should be directed by the parents. The bedtime routine should end with a phrase, song or action that shows it is now time to sleep. As much as possible the bedtime routine should be the same each night
- **Caffeine** food and drink that contain caffeine should not be consumed 6 hours before bedtime.
- **Exercise** limit exercise in the final hour before bedtime as it can raise the internal temperature of the body, making you feel less sleepy.
- **Timing** work out the amount of sleep your child needs and when they need to wake up. Count back to work out what time your child needs to go to bed.
- Bedroom environment try to avoid having toys out in the bedroom at bedtime. Try to make sure the bed, bedroom and bedtime routine show the child it is time to go to sleep.
- **Sleep associations** try to make the bedroom the same as it would be if the child was to wake in the night. E.g. if they need a nightlight to settle, keep it on all night.
- Screen time devices should be turned off in the hour before bedtime as the light from them can interfere with the brain's production of the 'sleepy' hormone, melatonin.

What to do if you are worried about your child's sleep

- 1. Look at the sleep hygiene notes above and think about your child's sleep hygiene. Is there anything you need to add or change?
- 2. Complete a sleep diary as shown on the next page.
- 3. Take the sleep diary to a GP and wait for their next steps.
- 4. The doctor may suggest your child takes a hormone like Melatonin which helps you sleep more easily.
