Phase Leader Updates - KS2

This term has been another action-packed one in KS2 with so much exciting learning taking place. Let's have a look at some of the highlights over the past few months.



Year 4 have been working incredibly hard towards their Victorious Voices concert this term. The performance took place at Rayner Stephens school on Friday 1st December and was a roaring success! The children performed the song 'Nazareth' from the film 'The Nativity'. Mrs. Oldham, who went to watch the performance, was overwhelmed with the

effort and passion the Y4 children showed when singing. She said it made the hairs on the back of her neck stand up – a big well done to Year 4!

Year 5 have been studying Indian food this half-term with Mrs. Wong in Design Technology. As part of their learning, the class went on a trip to Arundale to cook the meals that they had been planning. In order to make their meals, they first went to Tesco to buy the their ingrediencies. The children thought carefully about what they would need so that their food had the flavours that they desired. After that, it was time for the most exciting part: the cooking itself. The children were shown how to use a knife safely and cut vegetables. Next, they put all their ingredients in a pot on the hob and stirred it until perfection. They produced sag aloo, a tomato & chickpea curry, raita dip and accompanying rice. I can say from firsthand experience that their meals were



absolutely delicious!

In Year 5 & 6 this term, we have had two really interesting workshops. The first workshop that the children attended was all about how to be a respectable citizen and support people in the community. Both classes asked some excellent questions and it was great to see the children building

positive relationships with our Police Community Support Officers.

The second workshop that children attended this term was ran by 'Show Racism the Red Card'. The sessions helped the children look at ways of identifying prejudice and how they could seek help if these issues where impacting them. It also showed the children how they could be allies for those who had been affected by racism and how best to challenge it. I was very impressed with the maturity the children showed when speaking about such an important subject matter. As well as this, the Discovery staff also had a training session on the same day which was extremely beneficial.

SENCO SPOTLIGHT

'Wearing those clothes makes me feel like my skin is crawling with maggots.'

This was a quote from an autistic person that was shared during some training I attended recently about autism and wellbeing. It really struck me and made me think more about the sensory needs some children are trying hard to manage every day.


Sensory needs

Our senses provide us with information and difficulties in processing and organising this information is referred to as sensory processing difficulties. People with neurological differences such as autism, learning disabilities,

Developmental Coordination Disorder (DCD), Attention Deficit

Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) and Global Developmental Delay can have sensory processing difficulties, but they can also be seen in people without any other diagnosis.

Behaviour, movement, co-ordination and concentration can all be affected by sensory processing difficulties and they can also affect self-esteem which can affect participation in activities linked to daily life, learning and play.



Children with sensory processing difficulties can be over sensitive, under sensitive or sensory seeking.

The tables below briefly outline these needs. These were created following sensory processing training that we received from Tameside's Occupational Therapy service.

What to do if I think my child has sensory processing difficulties?

Increase your knowledge about why your child is behaving as they are. You may want to keep a diary of what you see, what sensory aspects could be the triggers e.g. noise, smell – be a sensory detective

Talk to your child about what you have noticed, how do particular sensory experiences make them feel?

Help your child regulate their behaviours – you may need to give your child resources to help with this e.g. ear defenders, a weighted blanket, chewelry

Change the environment to reduce sensory processing difficulties.

Be especially aware that certain times may cause sensory

processing difficulties e.g. Christmas with extra lights, sounds, different smells. Be aware that your child may dislike new places because of the sensory processing difficulties this brings.

Be aware that senses can be heightened if your child is anxious and they may require more support or adaptations than usual.

Discuss difficulties with school by talking to your child's class teacher or Mrs Mayers so we can look out for triggers and offer advice, adaptations or support as required e.g. ear defenders, ear plugs, seating a child on the end of table/line so the noise around them is less, use of fidgets, wobble cushions or wobble boards

If your child has several sensory needs that are affecting their daily life, you can discuss these with Mrs Mayers who will complete a sensory referral for you. From this you are sent an invitation to sensory processing training from Tameside's occupational therapy service. This training is video based and you can complete it in your own time.

This referral also gives you a contact to use if your child's needs suddenly change or you need further advice

Scan the QR code for advice about sensory processing difficulties and particular aspects of self-care e.g. dressing, eating and drinking, toileting and toothbrushing.

Curriculum Focus - PE

At Discovery Academy, we love all things sport and this term we picked up right where we left off at the end of summer term.

In September, our mixed football team had a very impressive 8-1 win versus St. Georges (Hyde). It was the first game for many of the Year 5 children and they excelled. It was great to see the way the new team gelled straight away and it looks like we're going to have a very exciting season ahead.



The girls' team also got off to an equally impressive start. They played away against Gee Cross and after the game finished 0-0, they held their nerve in a very tense penalty shootout which resulted in a 3-2 win for Discovery. They too go through to the next round of the cup that will be played in the new year.



At the start of the academic year, Year 6 took part in two days of 'Bikeability'. This programme allows children to learn how to ride their bikes proficiently as well as having a good understanding of road safety. We were so impressed with how well the Year 6 children during the course and all the instructors commented positively on their maturity.

In PE lessons, the children have been taking part in some really interesting sports and developing some vital skills:

Year 1 - ball skills (control with hands);

Year 2 - ball skills (movement);


Year 1

What an amazing start to Year 1 we have had!

In English we have explored story settings and written a setting description based around The Gruffalo. Then we explored how to write a Biography about someone's life. We used our History knowledge about Rosa Parks to support our learning! After the October half term, our classroom turned into a train! We explored the different places you will see during a train ride and used this to write a short narrative!



In Math's, the children have explored number bonds within 10! They have used a part whole

In Geography, we have explored the most important places in the United Kingdom. We have investigated the 4 countries of the UK, their flags, their capital cities and some facts about each one! The children have gone on a virtual walk of England's capital city, London. They then had to write setting description about it using their senses!



In Science, the children have investigated materials. We have explored a wide range of different materials and compared them against each other using their properties. The children had to sort and classify materials into groups of hard and soft. The children then used their knowledge of materials to conduct an experiment. They had to help our person of Interest, Alistair Pilkington, to build a house to put his Float glass windows into. The children had to test a materials wind resistance, flexibility and strength and

conclude what material was the most appropriate to build a house out of and why!




In computing, we have been recreating pieces of artwork from famous Artists using a computer program. In DT, the children have explored pullies and levers to create 3D Christmas cards. In PSHE, we explored healthy lifestyles and learnt how to stay clean, eat healthy foods and maintain a healthy sleep cycle.

Year 2

All the children have settled really well into Year 2 this term and their effort and commitment to their work has been commendable.

They have enjoyed discovering and learning so many new things from how to spell some of the Year 2 Common Exception Words to the significance of Walter Tull and Albert Einstein to what it is to be a hero themselves.



In Maths, they've discovered the value of numbers and have been adding and subtracting numbers up to 100. They have enjoyed using practical apparatus in Maths to explore new addition and subtraction concepts including where they need to exchange and have shown a deeper understanding of these through their reasoning and problem solving

many creative ideas!







British Sign Language club

"Using British Sign Language encourages diversity and this trickles down to the wider community, helping to develop a more accepting attitude to differences." - Alysha Allen.

In a bid to foster inclusivity and bridge communication gaps, our school has proudly introduced a British Sign Language (BSL) club. This initiative has not only enriched the cultural diversity of our school but has also empowered students with a valuable skill set that goes beyond the curriculum.

The BSL club, initiated with the goal of promoting understanding and inclusivity, has made remarkable strides in a short period. In such a short time the children involved have learnt the BSL alphabet, learnt numbers to 100 and have begun to take part in short dialogues that will support them in learning more intricate signs as we progress through the year. Not only does this empower them with a unique skill set, but it also nurtures a sense of empathy and understanding for those who communicate primarily through sign language.



The BSL club supports our school values, as we are always discovering new signs, improving our hand gestures, inspiring others to join in, achieving in conversational skills and showing our caring value to a whole community of people who use BSL as their main form of communication.

As we celebrate the achievements of our BSL club, we look forward to a future where communication knows no boundaries, and understanding is the cornerstone of our diverse community. We can't wait to continue to develop our skills and share them with our community.

Year 3 We have had a fantastic first term in Year 3.

In English we have written fiction and non-fiction pieces, including our own version of The Three Little Pigs and writing persuasive letters to our classroom equipment.

Also, we will be completing a poetry unit in the run up to Christmas.

In guided reading we have looked at fiction and non-fiction texts and poetry. We have also been reading about Mary Anning and Palaeontologists in science. We have also been engaging well in our class novels. One of our favourites so far has been Anisha, Accidental Detective (especially the part when Aunty Bindhi's Henna doesn't go quite according to plan!)

In maths we have been focusing on place value, addition and subtraction. We have been working on column addition and subtraction and carrying over into the next column. We have also begun to look at making equal groups and sharing to answer multiplication and division problems. We have used counters to see the groups and have been using these resources to prove answers.

In Science, we have been working scientifically and learnt the skills we need in order to conduct fair and accurate investigations. We used this knowledge to conduct some experiments. We looked at how changing a variable can affect the results and observed how long it takes different ice lollies to melt.



In History we have been learning about Martin Luther King Jr, the activist who campaigned for Civil Rights and we linked this with our prior knowledge of Rosa Parks. We wrote a diary entry from the point of view of a young girl who went to watch the I Have a Dream speech with her father.

In Geography we have been looking at the different countries and areas which make up the UK. We have used the atlas to look at cities and compass points to recognise the direction someone would travel to get from city to city. We have linked this to our DT sessions where we have looked at different foods from across the British Isles. We

used our skills to order and prepare food to make a tasty dish of our own.

In Art, we have looked at how to use charcoal in a variety of ways. Focussing on shading and pressure and seeing how that can change our overall piece. We also looked at natural objects and how we could use

charcoal to mimic shadow and light.

A particular highlight of this term has been our incredible Spanish Day activity where we walked on tomatoes like at the La Tomatina Festival, it was a much-loved activity, but very messy!

Maths lessons have been a whirlwind of excitement and growth. Year 4 has fearlessly tackled the complexities of addition and subtraction, and Miss McBain and I can see their confidence and skills growing with every lesson. Times tables has been a focus over the last few months and the children have become inspired by the songs we sing to help learn them. You can often hear them being sung around the school.

Art has been a canvas for sensory exploration, with students delving into the world of sensory drawing. The creative energy in the classroom has been palpable as the children have honed their artistic skills, expressing themselves through vibrant and tactile creations.

The Spanish skills of Year 4 have expanded as they seamlessly weave through the basics of Spanish, discovering the names and uses of classroom equipment. I'm sure the children will be able to tell you what my favourite word is


After half term, we continued to work on poetry and looked at shape poems, acrostic



In maths we have been focusing on place value, addition and subtraction and really focused on fractions. Year 5 have been looking at converting improper

fractions to mixed number fractions. Their knowledge of times tables and division has really helped them with understanding fractions. We have looked closely at inverse operations in maths.

In Science we enjoyed some fun investigation, like growing our own crystals and we even did some bottle flipping. This was a fun lesson for year 5. We have also looked closely at forces and made our own parachutes and boats to test the effects of air and water resistance. Everyone loved throwing their parachutes off the balcony.

In our History lessons we have been learning about Mahatma Ghandi and the fight for India's independence. Year 6 have hit the ground running this year

So far, we have explored a range of topics including: South Africa and the Apartheid in History, the world of 2D-to-3D art influenced by Lubaina Himid, and creating a greener future, looking at how we can live sustainably in Geography! It has been a packed year so far, with much more to come, so have a read on to look further into what we have been up to!

When **discovering** the history of South Africa, we have learned what it was like to live at a time with such disunion and segregation. The children discussed what skills Nelson Mandela had, which supported him to become such an influential leader. We have also journeyed to ancient China when exploring 'The Firework Maker's Daughter' by Philip Pullman in our reading and English lessons. From this, the children produced their own version of a story, which tackled stereotypes put onto a range of different people within different cultures. Throughout all of our writing this year, we have discovered a wide range of exciting and ambitious vocabulary that we have been using to engage the reader in whatever we write.

From the get go, Year 6 have been **achieving** great things this year! At the very start of year 6, we had the opportunity to have Active Tameside come to school to support us in gaining our Bikeability awards. The children blew us away with their sensible and caution attitudes when learning how to cycle safely on the roads. It is delightful to see all the achievement the children have been receiving outside of school, from football trophies to race medals, Year 6 continue to inspire each other to be the best they can be, even with a little friendly competition from time to time.

A few weeks ago, the children from Year 6 had a full day where they explored the impact that racism, where the children were asked to create something that would help inspire others to not only think about their actions, but hold each other accountable for their discriminatory behaviours. Year 6, along with Year 5, created some brilliantly **inspiring** artwork, posters and short plays, which explored the impact racism can have on anyone, and how we can tackle it in school and out in the community. The children listened to each other and showed great amounts of respect and tolerance of the thoughts of others.



There has been a lot of **improving** taking place so far this year also. Year 6 have been working hard on consolidating all of their knowledge from Key Stage Two. We have been revisiting previous learning in maths and delving deeper into the mathematical processes including: place value, fractions and the four main operations (addition, subtraction, multiplication and division). Additionally, Year 6 have been working hard to further improve their reading and writing skills. The children have tackled many texts this term and have asked inquisitive questions and explored the use of a wide range of literacy skills including: figurative language to add flair to our stories, active and passive voice to create an eerie level of suspense in our twisted fairy-tales, and proper use of punctuation to ensure our reader has a great time reading our stories, letters and postcards.
