Mr Roberts attended the event with Israel and his family.


"When we began learning about Manchester in preparation for this poetry work, I couldn't have imagined how quickly the children would take these themes and run with them. Seeing

Staff have been especially impressed by the children's confidence and teamwork as they support one another through each run-through. For some, this will be their first time performing in front of a large audience, and staff have praised their resilience and determination.

Rehearsals have taken place both in classrooms and the school hall, where pupils have been learning how to stand in their performance positions, wait for their cues, and use expressive voices. Some pupils have taken on roles as narrators, practising clear and fluent reading with prosody to help guide the audience through the story of

the Nativity. The children have also been enthusiastically rehearsing their actions, bringing the songs to life with big smiles and plenty of festive sparkle.

Behind the scenes, teachers and teaching assistants have been helping to prepare simple props and costumes. Curriculum Focus Relationships, Sex and Health Education

At Discovery Academy, we believe that Relationships (and, where appropriate, Sex) and Health Education is essential in helping children navigate friendships, emotions, safety and the realities of growing up. It is a statutory part of the curriculum and plays a key role in supporting pupils' wellbeing, safeguarding and emotional development.

Following the recent government guidance, we have reviewed and adapted our curriculum to ensure it delivers the following core themes clearly and ageappropriately:

Relationships Education Families and people who care for me Caring friendships Respectful relationships Online Relationships Being Safe

Mental Wellbeing Internet safety and harms Physical health and fitness Healthy eating Drugs, alcohol and tobacco Health and prevention Basic First Aid Changing bodies

Our lessons follow the Twinkl PSHE and RSHE framework, which is carefully sequenced so knowledge builds gradually from year to year. Children are not taught any sexual content beyond what is required in the national science curriculum. The only additional content is a Year 6 lesson on what a sexual relationship is, including the law around the age of consent.

Health Education includes the statutory teaching of puberty and the changes children

experience as they grow. This covers both physical changes and the emotional changes children may face as they navigate adolescence.

We recognise that children sometimes ask questions that fall outside the curriculum. When this happens, teachers respond sensitively and will refer the child to a Designated Safeguarding Lead for support, in collaboration with parents and carers.

PSHE, wellbeing and personal development run through everything we do at Discovery. In Science, pupils learn how their bodies work and change; in English, they explore relationships between characters and how people manage various challenges; and in assemblies, we discuss the diverse people in our community and how we can support and respect one another. This whole-school approach ensures children always know who they can talk to when they have concerns, helps them make sense of the world around them, and continually reinforces our school value of caring.

We also ensure that curriculum content is not only age-appropriate but adapted to meet the individual needs of the pupils in our care. We take thoughtful account of different family structures, additional needs, and lived experiences, and make sure every lesson is taught in a values-driven, respectful and inclusive way.

RSHE helps children build strong friendships, understand their feelings, resolve

conflict and make healthy, safe choices. We hope this update has been helpful, and we welcome any questions you may have about how RSHE and PSHE are taught here at Discovery.

The Discovery Striders **discovered** what they are each capable of when they focus on a given task. They also **discovered** how much they can achieve when they work as a team.

The Discovery Striders completed a Santa Dash around the MUGA and paths around the MUGA. Mrs Mayers measured that the length of each lap was 0.27km. The Discovery Striders ran as many laps as they could in around 27 minutes. They started

each lap with a letter and after dashing round the route, placed the letter in the postbox. Each letter was worth 27p towards charity, so the Discovery Striders had an important job to do, dashing round as much as they could to raise as much as possible!



Through the event, we saw each member of the Discovery Striders improve, achieve, inspire and care! The event showcased everything they had learnt with Mrs Mayers and Miss Goodson. We saw they had improved their fitness and their ability to adjust

the speed of each lap according to their energy levels. We saw them **inspire** each other to keep going; no runner was left behind and we saw the Discovery Striders slow down and speed up to keep each other motivated to **achieve**. We saw the Discovery Striders care if someone was struggling and also show that they can run in opposite directions carefully without slowing each other down. We saw the Discovery Striders achieve results on their own, but most importantly together!

In around 27 minutes, the Discovery Striders ran 142 laps! This means Mrs Mayers and Miss Goodson are going to donate £38.34 to charity. This amount has been matched by Mrs Oldham and others have said they will donate too. We hope to be able to donate £100.

We have asked the Discovery Striders for their suggestions about which charity to support. Two of the Discovery Striders mentioned their dad is involved in supporting Purple Heart Wishes. Purple Heart Wishes is a UK charity dedicated to granting wishes for adults aged 18-55 who are living with terminal illnesses, aiming to create memorable experiences and bring joy.

Curriculum Focus

Raising Early Attainment in

Literacy

We have had a super turn out in our third year of implementing the 'REAL' project at Discovery Academy. The project is targeted at raising early achievement in Literacy for the children in Nursery and Reception. We are working together with families on a programme of activities following 4 key elements, Environmental Print, Oral Language, Early Writing and Books.

- Print in the environment encourages children to talk about it and helps them become aware that print has meaning.
- Speaking is the foundation for written language.
- Young children who are given the opportunity to experiment with tactile materials become confident mark-makers.
- We want children to develop a love for books and reading.



We have had fantastic parental participation so far attending our events. The children have loved seeing their parents join us in class and sharing their experiences. We acted out stories, identified logos and signs in the environment. We joined in with nursery rhymes and got crafty designing and creative using many resources.

We are looking forward to seeing all our families at the whole class events over Christmas. In the New year we plan to visit the local shops and library, hope to see you there.

SENCO SPOTLIGHT

Though I am writing this linked to Christmas, I hope you will find it useful for any celebration

Christmas is a time we often associate with joy, fun, laughter and memory making. However, for some children it can be overwhelming, worrying and increase anxiety. I hope these tips help all children and families have a relaxing Christmas.

Christmas looks different for everyone! Make a list of things you remember or notice your child struggles with at Christmas. Don't be afraid to let some things go to help your child enjoy Christmas more. Your perfect Christmas is what works for you and your family!

Routines and predictability – Write all the events your child has on a calendar so they can see how many days it is until that happens. Try to keep some familiar routines to create stability e.g. bedtime the same.

Plan rest days or recovery days. Make these days as low demand for your child as possible. If you have had a busy day seeing relatives or enjoying a Christmas activity, give your child time the next day to rest and recharge.

Prepare your child with visual cues and 'what ifs' – make a list of activities happening and/or people coming so your child is ready for the day. include 'what ifs' e.g. if it too loud, I can use my ear defenders, if I don't want to play the game, I can listen to music

instead. Agree in advance a discreet non-verbal signal that your child can use to say they need a break from an activity e.g. a gentle squeeze of the hand. If you are visiting other people, ask if there is a quiet space your child can go to if they need a break.

Create a script for social



situations e.g. how to respond to receiving a gift – Thank you for my present. I'll enjoy opening that once I'm home. You could practice using teddies how your child might greet people they haven't seen for a while

Think about sensory differences – the lights, the smells, the food, the noise – these can all be too much at Christmas. Focus on your child's preferences instead of what is traditional or expected.

Don't focus too much on Father Christmas – some children worry a lot about someone coming into the house or being on the 'nice list.' You could focus less on this aspect or explain you have spoken to Father Christmas and he will do something different to reassure your child.

Christmas gifts – these can cause excitement or uncertainty. Your child may want a clue before they open the gift, to open presents without an audience or a open a few at a time over a few days.

Be kind to yourself – plan activities for you, think about your self-care, if you are calm, you can help your child stay calm.

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Curriculum Focus

International Languages Day

On Thursday 26th September, our school came alive with colour, curiosity and celebration as we marked the 25th anniversary of the International Day of Languages. With this year's theme, "Open Hearts and Minds," the children across the school embraced a wide range of activities to promote positivity, global connections and a deeper appreciation for the power of language.

From the moment the day began, there was a real buzz in the air. Children arrived wearing their own clothes, proudly showing off outfits that reflected different



cultures, colours and personal styles. House teams gathered together and set off on a day of discovery, ready to explore new languages, ideas and traditions.

The children in Early Years and Key Stage One enjoyed a wonderful introduction to Spanish. Their activities were chosen to spark excitement and build early confidence with a new language. The children had great fun learning numbers, colours and the names of fruits, and they especially loved hearing and exploring the Spanish version of a Discovery favourite: *The Very Hungry Caterpillar*. It was fantastic to see our nursery and reception children confidently moving around the school, engaging with new adults, classrooms and experiences. All the children approached every challenge with curiosity and joy.



Key Stage Two pupils also had an action-packed morning as they carouseled through activities with their house teams. They began by looking at just how vast and diverse the European continent truly is, discovering the huge variety of languages spoken across its many countries. Using this knowledge, pupils created thoughtful acrostic poems about Europe, reflecting the continent's cultures, landscapes and people.

Another highlight of the day was the creation of

Passports to Europe. Pupils researched fascinating facts about different countries, such as national dishes, styles of music and dance, and, of course, famous footballers. These passports represented each child's curiosity and hard work.

To deepen their understanding of language pupils also took part in a dialogue-matching activity. This turned out to be one of the most exciting parts of the day, as children were surprised to discover that some phrases in different European languages are incredibly similar, while others are rather unique.

The excitement, teamwork and curiosity shown by our pupils was a true reflection of the day's theme!

Curriculum Focus

Phonics Workshops

This term we were delighted to welcome parents and carers to our annual Autumn EYFS and KS1 Phonics Workshops. The sessions were designed to give families a clear understanding of how phonics is taught in Reception and KS1 and how to support early reading and writing at home. It was a great turn out.

During the workshops, teachers explained the structure of our Little Wandle phonics programme, including how we introduce **phonemes** (sounds), graphemes (written letters), and blending and segmenting skills.

Parents in Reception and Nursery had the opportunity to join in with practical activities, mirroring those the children experience in class—such as soundsorting games, oral blending activities, and simple decoding tasks. Many parents commented that seeing the strategies in action helped them feel more confident about supporting reading at home.



It was also great to see parents joining in with nursery rhymes and actions, as they are extremely valuable to support early language and communication development, build confidence and prepare children for reading and writing as they get older.



In Year 1, parents watched and took part in a typical phonics lesson, and were introduced to the key terminology children learn, such as digraphs, trigraphs, tricky words, and blending. It was also a good opportunity to share information about the Year 1 Phonics Screening Check and we worked together to blast those tricky alien words.

It was great to get so much positive feedback from parents about our in-class reading rewards charts too and to know that there is so much reading going

on at home. It is hard to choose just one Reading Hero each half term, so it's a lovely way to celebrate reading and to give something back to the children for all their efforts.

Thank you to everyone who attended our workshops and engaged so enthusiastically. We hope they have strengthened the partnership between home and school as we work together to develop children's early reading and literacy skills. We look forward to seeing you all for our 'Come and Read' sessions in the Spring where you can snuggle up with your child and read a good book in our classrooms or school library.

I also wanted to say a very big WELL DONE to the children that took part in the Summer Reading Challenge at Hattersley Library this year.
